

Pastor's Corner By Pastor Dave Heckler





ta; this latest book is volume 4 of a series of books exploring how a long history of cultural changes inside and outside of the church have reshaped what it means to be communities of faith doing ministry in the world. (The other books in the series include <u>Faith Formation in a Secular Age: Responding to the Church's Obsession with Youthfulness, The Congregation in a Secular Age: Keeping Sacred Time Against the Speed of Modern Life, and the book I'm currently listening to, <u>The Pastor in a Secular Age: Ministry to People Who No Longer Need a God.</u> As you might imagine, even the title of this last volume is sobering...) Among the things Root points out is that until about 450 years ago, even the concept of "religion" as something distinct from fundamental reality didn't really exist; the human struggle with sin, death, and the demonic was every bit as fundamental to the way people understood the world (and maybe even more fundamental) than were the basic laws of physics. But since the Enlightenment and the rise of scientific thought, our understanding of and relationship with God and "the spiritual" has become increasingly individualistic and compartmentalized and decreasingly transcendent and institutional, leading us to where we find ourselves now— in the place to which all of Root's titles testify.</u>

Needless to say, that conversation wasn't very comforting. "The Pastor in a Secular Age: Ministry to People Who No Longer Need a God": that title and that reality are a gut punch to those of us who've followed God's call to pastoral ministry in the church and now find ourselves, with our congregations, in a state of "malaise" (to use Root's word). And as I write this before we celebrate the Reformation's clarion call of Jesus that "you shall know the truth, and the truth shall set you free," I'm reminded of Ogden Nash's pithy reworking of that declaration— "You shall know the truth, and the truth will make you odd"— and recognizing that we're all struggling to understand (and feel good about) how we live out Christ's call to discipleship and ministry in the world given all our no-longer quite-so-glorious "oddness"...

The month of November isn't officially its own season of the Church year, but it probably should be. (And personally, I'd lump Reformation Sunday in with that "Season of November".) Throughout November, our gospel readings take their stand "on the brink" of both Jesus' suffering and death and the fulfillment of the ages. Reformation Sunday leads it off with the utterly counter-cultural assertion that our lives are justified and made right with God by God's grace through the faithfulness of Christ Jesus and *not* by our works, pieties, credentials, or accomplishments. Then the Feast of All Saints meets us with a white-robed multitude gathered around God's throne, a multitude of people who've come through "the great ordeal" and whose robes have been utterly cleansed by "the blood of the Lamb"— people who surely come from the motley crew of "the blessed" in Jesus' Beatitudes. As November's Sundays move on, we get a taste of Advent's admonitions to "keep watch" and expect Christ's coming at an unknown hour; and as we come to the final Sunday in November and the Church year, we find the eternally enthroned Son of Man commending the righteous for a righteousness they don't even know they have— a righteousness displayed not via the usual protocols of welcoming royalty, but in their encounters with "the least of these" who turn out (to their surprise) to be Christ Jesus Himself in distressing disguise. It's a season that sings of Christ's triumph and glory, but locates that triumph and glory in the oddest and seemingly most inglorious encounters. To use religious terminology, it repeatedly locates God's awesome and mysterious transcendence in the midst of the immanent— and not through spectacle or miracle, but through presence and accompaniment: through walking with folks in their journeys of faith and life, not with a finger wagging at their mistakes and questions, but with a humility and grace and faithfulness that's so "odd" that it begs for explanation, or better yet, for testimony.

Spoiler alert: Even amidst our frustration as God's people at the changes going on around us, even amidst our haunting suspicions that we're somehow failing our calling or just aren't needed anymore, it's to precisely this >>


sort of "holy oddness" that Root points us and our ministries in this "crisis of decline"—to this "oddness" in which the strange and saving grace of God in Christ can be seen among "the least of these". That's not going to be easy, especially when we're striving for institutional survival and making a living. But November reminds us that this is where the glory of God continues to show up and change people's lives, even amidst our society's riptides. And this, *this*, is where we'll find Christ Jesus our Lord among us...

Worship in November: "For All the Saints!"

November's the time of year when the Church remembers all those who've entered into the fullness of eternal life and begins looking forward to the consummation of history in the return of Christ Jesus. Here at St Paul's, we're celebrating the time in some neat ways:

Throughout the month of November, we'll be using the classic **LBW Setting 2** as our base liturgy, singing "This is the Feast of Victory!" with gusto and chanting the Kyrie and Proper Prefaces joyfully, rejoicing in the beauty of the Lord's holiness.



November 5 is **the Feast of All Saints**, when we remember our brothers and sisters who've died over the past year. We'll light the Paschal Candle in remembrance of Jesus' resurrection shared with them, and light votive candles in their individual remembrance. By the way, November 5 marks the end of Daylight Savings Time— so before you go to bed November 4, make sure to make your clocks "fall back" one hour (if they don't already do so automatically) so you can enjoy the extra hour of sleep before joining us for worship Sunday morning!

On **November 12**, we'll be celebrating Veterans Day with the "Witting Tree", remembering and rejoicing in those who serve our nation in the armed forces, and also remembering the 20 veterans who take their own lives every day to end the pain of PTSD, moral injury, and deep woundedness of soul.

On **November 26**, we'll celebrate **the Reign of Christ**, the last Sunday of the Church year, with a service that ponders where one might find Christ seated on His royal throne and reigning in glory.

Remember that we're sharing in worship and fellowship together both in person and online. And we'll keep on "livestreaming" our worship services via Facebook Live and streaming the audio of our services via our Free Conference Call line (857.232.0157, conference code 144261).


And remember as well that for in-person indoor worship, we need a variety of ministry helpers. There are many ways to get involved. Bulletin collators pick up the bulletins at their convenience on the weekend, fold them at home, and return them Sunday morning. Crucifers/Acolytes carry the cross and light the candles. Communion Assistants help distribute Communion. Ushers direct people to their seats and answer questions/guide visitors. Readers read Scripture during the service. The altar guild prepares the altar before service on Sundays and cleans up the altar after worship. It's a month full of special worship events— and certainly full of the presence, peace, and power of our Lord Jesus Christ giving Himself to us and for us in Word and Sacrament. 

November is Diabetes Awareness Month

The CDC (Centers for Disease Control) reports that 37 million people in the United States have diabetes. More than 8 in 10 adults have prediabetes & do not know it.

Type 1 diabetes, or what we used to call "childhood diabetes", accounts for between 5% and 10% of all diabetes cases. It is important to point out that Type 1 diabetes is an autoimmune disease & not able to be controlled by diet or lifestyle changes. However, Type 1 diabetes can develop at any age with no know way to prevent it.

Type 2 diabetes, on the other hand, develops when the body is not able to utilize its own insulin properly. In the past, Type 2 diabetes was thought of as an older adult disease. Unfortunately, more & more young people are developing Type2 diabetes due to poor eating habits & lack of exercise. Type 2 diabetes also has a propensity to be linked to family history. The good news about Type 2 diabetes is that it can be successfully managed with lifestyle changes such as proper diet & exercise. Type 2 diabetes can need an addition of an oral diabetic medication or in some cases the addition of supplemental injectable insulin.


