Pastor's Corner by Pr Dave Heckler



Welcome to April! Once again, we're anticipating the climactic event of the Christian year, our holy remembrance of the suffering, death, and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ—a remembrance and celebration rich with drama, power, paradox, and ultimately triumph, all of which our liturgies testify to and lived out. For worship leaders, this season is always filled with activity and sometimes fraught with anxiety and exhaustion...

But alas, we're doing so while war's going on in Ukraine, Gaza, Sudan, Libya, Yemen, the DRC, and in so many homes and neighborhoods right here in America. All of these are

intentionally inflicted humanitarian disasters of epic proportions— and alas, the adrenaline rush of all this violence is so addictive and compelling that entire nations (including our own) lie under its thrall. Worse yet, in many cases such violence is commended and encouraged by Christians themselves— a blasphemy so blatant and obvious that it's driven millions of young adults away from the Church, even as it attracts so many others to its siren song of future "greatness"...

But as this season (not to mention the history of the past 2000 years) reminds us, the sad hypocrisy we're seeing right now is nothing new. Alas, Christians of every age and in every land have been doing this for ages. (And we ourselves aren't immune to this hypocrisy; there are plenty of folks in our own land who aspire to such "dominionism" and "Christian nationalism" in the pursuit of national "greatness" and religious and moral "purity" and social "cleansing"...) And it all rises from a notion of God's power and authority that desperately wants us to skip from Palm Sunday's "triumphal entry" directly to Jesus' resurrection and ascension and ignore the crucified Christ, preferring to use the cross of Christ only as a battle emblem, as in "In hoc signe vinces!' ("By this sign, conquer!")

Nevertheless, Holy Week comes around every year to remind us that this isn't God's way. It's *never* been God's way. And the proof of this is seen in Christ Jesus: While the crowds are cheering on Palm Sunday, Jesus is weeping [Luke 19.41-42—"How I wish today that you of all people would understand the way to peace; but now it's too late, and peace is hidden from your eyes."]. When Jesus knows that God has given Him complete power, He chooses to use that power to wash His disciples' feet, the job of the lowest of household slaves [John 13], and to feed them with His very life ["This is My body/blood, given/shed for you"]. When Judas betrays Jesus to try and force Him to "man up" and drive the religious leaders and the Romans out by force, Jesus refuses to defend Himself or lash out in violence. When Jesus is hanging from the cross and His accusers are demanding He prove His divine authority by saving Himself, Jesus refuses, giving His life for us even as we're trying to rip it from Him. And even when Jesus rises from death, He doesn't seek out those who'd condemned and crucified Him to deal them some payback, but goes to His fearful disciples and empowers them with the Holy Spirit to forgive others, and just so to make peace [John 20.19-31]. Indeed, when Jesus finally says in John 12 that "now the hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified", His very next statement is about the necessity of a grain of wheat falling into the earth and dying in order to bear much fruit— about God's glory being revealed in the giving of Himself even unto death, not in the seizure of others' lives and property unto His own "greatness".

In this and every year, Holy Week gives us a living tutorial of what really makes for "the Kingdom and the power and the glory" of God. And to skip it, either in our imaginations or our liturgies or our ways of living out the Gospel in the world, is ultimately to embark not simply on a path of heresy or even blasphemy, but an inevitable path toward violence— a violence sadly on display right now. The question for us, even as we re-enter the rich drama of this Holy Week, is whether we'll allow this violence for which we condemn others to challenge our own hearts and steer us away from falling into this same violent path ourselves...

Holy Week and Easter: The Victory of Our God!

"Were you there when they crucified my Lord?" the classic spiritual asks us. In the Great and Holy Week of the Church year, we answer "Yes" with humility and awe, following Christ along the way of the cross for our salvation and recognizing our own complicity in His death and our sharing in the saving benefits of His Passion through our baptismal union with Him. Here's how we'll observe this Great and Holy Week:



- On April 6, the Fifth Sunday in Lent, we behold Mary of Bethany (who may also be Mary Magdalene) anointing Jesus with oil at a dinner party being held in His honor. "She's done this to prepare Me for burial," Jesus tells those gathered (which probably shocked even Mary)— but she also did it out of pure, unabashed love for Jesus, a love whose passion mirrors Jesus' own love for us...
- On April 13, we begin the most solemn week of the Church year with a powerful Palm Sunday Eucharist, beginning with the blessing of palms and continuing with a congregational reading of the Passion of our Lord according to Matthew. After the service, we have a fun Palm Sunday/Easter Event for children and adults—so be sure to stick around after worship!
- April 14-16: Pr Dave will be posting Holy Week Daily Prayer services on our congregation's Facebook page (<u>www.facebook.com/StPaulsQtown</u>), sending out in advance a liturgy and the "propers" for Monday through Wednesday of Holy Week. We invite you to take some time each day of Holy Week to pray through these services.
- April 16: Come join Pr Dave and plenty of our friends from the Quakertown Lutheran Cluster at <u>6</u>:00 PM at St Isidore's Church on Pumping Station Road outside of Quakertown for a journey around the Stations of the Cross. For many of you, this may be a new experience— but it's a powerful way to "walk the walk" and contemplate Jesus' journey to the cross and beyond for our salvation.
- April 17: On Maundy Thursday @ 7:00 PM at St Paul's, we'll stand with Jesus at the brink, and see our sinful betrayals met by His self-giving love. We'll confess our sins once more, and this time we hear the strong word of God's forgiveness. We'll behold Jesus washing His disciples' feet, and find in this humble act the shape of our life in Him. We'll receive His Body and Blood, given and shed for us for the forgiveness of our sins. This powerful service closes in silent prayer, with the stripping of the altar foreshadowing the solemnity of Good Friday. Our friends from Christ UCC in Trumbauersville and perhaps even St John's in Richlandtown will be joining us at St Paul's for this service— and we'll also livestream this service from St Paul's on our Facebook page (www.facebook.com/stpaulsqtown/live).
- April 18: You're invited to join our neighbors throughout the Quakertown Ministerium at 12:00 PM in our annual Community Good Friday Service at First United Church of Christ in Quakertown (Park and Fourth Streets). This service will be an hour-long service featuring pastors from across our Quakertown area.
- April 18: We'll gather at Christ UCC in Trumbauersville with our friends from St John's Richlandtown and Christ's Lutheran in Trumbauersville at 7:00 PM to share in Good Friday Tenebrae. In the darkness of the evening, we gather for the reading of the Passion according to John, further dramatized by the dimming of lights, the crash of the *strepitus* symbolizing the sealing of Christ's tomb, and the hope-filled adoration of our Crucified Lord— the secret of life eternal whispered and shouted against the darkness.
- + On **April 19** @ **7:00 PM**, you're invited to share with our friends from across our Quakertown Lutheran Cluster **and** Pennridge Lutheran Cluster in **the Great Vigil of Easter** at St Andrew's Lutheran Church in Perkasie (on Dill Street). This service, which first gathers in darkness, features a candlelight procession, the reading of Scriptures and psalms that carry us through the span of the Hebrew Bible's story, a time to reaffirm our Baptism into union with Christ (and perhaps to witness a Baptism as well), and finally the first grand announcement of Christ's Easter victory and its celebration around the Table of Our Lord. If you've never experienced this service before, you really ought to check it out! (We're hoping to do this service in Quakertown in 2026...)



- + On **April 20** @ **6:00 AM**, come share with our Pennridge and Palisades area UCC neighbors in their annual **Easter Sunrise Eucharist** at the Harrisburg School Road Marina on Lake Nockamixon. Pr Dave will be helping to accompany this service with his guitar, and we'll be sharing in Holy Communion, letting our alleluias rise with the resurrection dawn.
- + And on **April 20 @ 9:00 AM**, our songs of rejoicing will fill the air with the fragrance of Easter lilies and the presence of the Risen Christ in Word and Sacrament


as we celebrate the great Feast of **the Resurrection of Our Lord: Easter Day**. And we'll follow this service with our annual **Easter Breakfast** for the whole congregation.

- + Remember that we're sharing in worship and fellowship together both in person and online and sharing together in weekly Holy Communion. And we'll keep on "livestreaming" our worship services via Facebook Live and streaming the audio of our services via our Free Conference Call line (857.232.0157, conference code 144261).
- + We're also moving toward restoring a number of our traditional worship practices such as "passing the [offering] plates" to receive our offering and gathering around the Table for Holy Communion rather than doing "continuous Communion" as we've been doing. (We're hoping to have both of these practices return the beginning of May.)
- + Mark **May 4** on your calendars— we'll be observing **"Rachel's Day"** that Sunday, remembering the many children whose lives are snuffed out each year by all forms of societal violence. If you're interested in helping with or participating in the leadership of this service, please contact Rose Sutkins at *rsutkins@gmail.com*.
- + And remember as well that for our worship, **we need a variety of ministry helpers.** There are many ways to get involved. **Crucifers/Acolytes** carry the cross and light the candles. **Communion Assistants** help distribute Communion. **Ushers** direct people to their seats or to the altar, distribute bulletins, answer questions, and guide visitors. **Readers** read Scripture during the service. The **altar guild** prepares the altar before service on Sundays and cleans up the altar after worship. Synod and Conference News



+ Our **Quakertown Lutheran Cluster Collaboration Task Force** has been working hard to build closer ministry partnerships among our congregations. Brett Shaw, Gordon Bryan, and Pr Dave have been representing us on this task force.

We're working on several areas of collaboration at this point. One of them is creating **more cluster worship activities** that bring us all together around the Word and sacraments. This year's Midweek Lenten Series— an expansion of our usual St John's-St Paul's partnership— is but one example of this.

We're also looking at developing a monthly "Dinner Church" service akin to our midweek Lenten services, but including Holy Communion. We've established a Quakertown Lutheran Cluster Facebook page, "Quakertown Area Lutherans Together". And to help us identify a common community ministry focus for our cluster, our task force is inviting each of our congregations to interview our local community leaders over the next several months. These will include our Haycock Twp. Supervisors, the fire chief, the local State Police contacts, and our AA, Al-Anon, and Scout leaders, among others.

+ Our **2025 SEPA Synod Assembly** will be held **May 30-31** at a new site, **Trinity Lutheran Church in Lansdale**. Our theme will be **"Ponder Anew"**, and we'll be electing a new synod vice-president at this assembly. Registration for Synod Assembly will be open soon; we know that Rose Sutkins and Aaron Shimalla (our youth/young adult delegate) will be representing us, but we could use an additional male delegate to represent us as well.
