

Pastor's Corner By Pastor Dave Heckler

One of the quirks of the ministry we share together is that I'm just slightly older than the median age of folks in our congregation— which suggests that many of you are facing the same basic life challenges that I am. And I suspect that has a great

deal to do with where we find ourselves (and even the larger Church) these days. Allow me some space for personal reflection:

In some ways, I'm ahead of many of you. Quite a few of you are experiencing "empty nest syndrome"; alas, my proverbial "nest" has been empty for at least four years now, with both of my sons in their thirties, living with their current or soon-to-be spouses, and facing the



challenges of young adulthood in the 2020s (which for Stephen and Betsy and a lot of other young adults includes working two jobs each to make ends meet). I was once in the "sandwich generation" myself, caring for parents and children at the same time; my parents have both been dead for over twenty years now— but I remember the struggles of navigating those dual responsibilities. But I'm also wrestling with the reality of my getting older and of having to wrestle with the reality of my own mortality. I'm turning 62 this year, which is no big deal— except that my dad died at 62. "I'm in much better physical shape than my dad was," I remind myself; but alas, the things that haunt you most rarely comply with your logic, and the experiences of your friends also inform your experiences. (At least three of my best friends from high school are now dealing with degenerative diseases and sizing up walkers and wheelchairs...) And retirement? What a concept! Be it blessing or bane, I don't see that in my future unless one of those disabling events comes home to roost in my own body. The church I love, the calling I love, and the bills that never stop coming need me to keep in action…

I'm pretty sure this is where many of you find yourselves these days. And these realities deeply affect how we relate to the Church, its rhythms of worship and service and fellowship, and the sustenance of its ongoing life and ministry. When the "nest" is empty but your health is still pretty good, it's understandable that you'd want to travel and enjoy all those things that childcare and other responsibilities made more difficult for years. When the stresses of being in the "sandwich generation" weigh heavy upon you, it's even more challenging to gather with a family that also wants you to serve and give of yourself and your resources. And when your health and mobility are facing challenges, or you're finding it harder to wrestle with or accept the changes and challenges of each new era of church and society, it only makes engagement with the community and ministry of the church and congregation all the more challenging. It's much easier to conclude that you've "put in your time" in your younger days, and that it's time for other folks to "step up"— that our life together is mostly about nurturing our younger members in faith and life, and once they're grown, letting others take their place in that calling…

But what if this new stage of life comes with its own new callings?

One of my favorite theologians and spiritual thinkers, Fr Richard Rohr, has written and spoken a great deal about "the second half of life". (He turns 80 this year, so he's done his share of thinking about these things...) In his book <u>Falling Upward</u>, he notes that in our "first half of life", our lives are shaped primarily by "making something of our lives"— establishing our homes and careers and vocational identities, taking care of children and parents, amassing our resources, and achieving those things that establish our individual identities in the eyes of our culture. Most people, Rohr asserts, figure that these things are what life is **all** about— that "the first half" is all there is. (It's one of the things that makes "retirement" a devastating thing for many people. "Who am I apart from my job, my status, my achievements?") But Rohr goes on to speak powerfully about the calling of "the second half of life", when we begin to engage the questions and challenges of our walk with God not to gain answers for our children, not to amass "principles for successful living", but to enter more deeply into a relationship with God that's shaped less by correct doctrines and more by a humble inner knowing. In this "second half of life", we have the opportunity to revisit the core beliefs of our faith in the light of greater maturity and experience; in our new spiritual home-sickness, our life with all its ups and downs becomes our great spiritual teacher. "In the second half of life," he writes, "we don't have strong and final opinions about everything, every event, or most people, as much as we allow things and people to delight us, sadden us, and truly influence us." Instead of "making something of our lives",

we have the freedom to discern what God has made of us, who we are at the core of our being instead of by the definitions of others, and how we can let God work through us to uniquely touch the lives of those around us...

I believe that if many of us are finding ourselves at the gates of "the second half of life", the church as the community of believers may be precisely where we need to be— not for our kids' sake or our parents' sake, but for our own sake. We have a new opportunity to bring our questions, to raise our questions, to wrestle with our questions, and together to discern how God in Christ Jesus addresses those questions by meeting us where we are, not where we used to be. We have a new opportunity to authentically be the body of Christ alive in the world, not because we have all the answers or have been appointed to hold dominion over the world around us, but because we've gone through too much to be anything other than totally human with one another, and we really don't have anything more we have to prove. (It actually reminds me a lot of the blessings of campus ministry— except that while we "second-halfers" have new opportunities to bring our questions, we're hopefully a lot wiser now than we were when we were college-age...)

Maybe this is what this particular Lent, with its inaugural call to "Remember that you're dust, and to dust you shall return", is all about for us. By coming back to the stories that shaped our Baptismal journey, by recognizing ourselves anew as being "buried with Christ and dead to sin," and by following Jesus on His own self-emptying journey to the cross, we can find the possibility, even in our "second half of life", to "arise with Christ to live in Him". Come join me on the journey, and let's see what wonders of new life God has in store for us...

March Worship News: Finding New Life in the Way of the Cross

+ Let's start out with a great reflection on this Year A Lenten season. As <u>Sun-</u> <u>days and Seasons 2017: Preaching</u> put it:

"Lent in Year A is Lent at its best, Lent at its most basic, Lent closest to its origin, Lent at its core. The readings that shape Lent in Year A... were used by early Christian communities that were ac-

companying inquirers and candidates for Baptism. This group of candidates had been assembled over several years, attracted by the message of the Gospel, the witness of other Christians, the mercy and service of the congregation, and the working of the Spirit. In the last year or so, they'd expressed a desire to become public followers or Jesus, that is, to be baptized. Now, after months of formation, only five or six weeks remained until their Baptism at Easter. These five gospel stories, with their Old Testament partners, moved these candidates and the whole congregation through Lent to Baptism at Easter. They've been preserved and carried forward to us as the Year A Lenten texts..."

- + Lent is a season in which we journey with Jesus from the divine declaration of Jesus' glory through the wilderness to the true glory of Christ Jesus seen in His cross. On **Sundays in Lent**, we'll use a "hymn mass" setting with canticles to familiar hymn tunes (including a variety of "Kyrie" settings).
- + March 12 marks the beginning of Daylight Savings Time— so before you go to bed on Saturday night March 11, make your clocks "spring forward" one hour! (Note: Your cell phones, computers, and alarm clocks will probably make this shift automatically...)



PAINT ST. PAUL'S: As a Congregation, we agreed that painting St. Paul's inside and out should be a priority to maintain the integrity of our structure and present a shining example of love for our home of worship.

We completed the painting in 2022 at a cost of \$19,900. We decided to defer raising the funds to cover the capital we withdrew from investments until we finished raising funds for the parking lot renovation. Having successfully met and exceeded our fundraising goal for the handicapped parking lot renovations, we are ready now to raise the funds to repay our investments.

In order to offset the cost of the painting project, the Congregation approved holding a capital campaign. **The Painting St. Paul's Campaign** will consist of a 3-year pledge period starting in March 2023. Campaign proceeds will replace the funds taken from the church's investments.

We also are **collecting personal hygiene** items for women through the YWCA: shampoo and conditioner, soap and body wash, face and body lotion, deodorant, toothpaste, toothbrushes, and mouthwash.

Finance News

Old Business:

Parish House Annual Meeting Jan 29: Bill and Tom presented the updated evaluations for renting or selling the parish house. The congregation voted to sell. Next step is to engage an appraiser for the property. Tom will schedule a meeting with QNB to discuss getting a line of credit or a loan. The Property Committee will also discuss the FireHouse's interest in the house and how much of their own work they would prefer to put into the property as well as how much land they wish to acquire. **OPEN**

On Going Business:

1. Vanguard Account Balances: As of January 31, 2023, \$98,223.28; December 31, 2022, **\$94,189.38**; November 30, 2022, **\$96,832.41**. In process to turn over management of account to Karen.

2. Income statement: As of January 31, 2023, expenses for the year exceed income (\$1327.48 DRAFT only); December 31, 2022, expenses for the year exceeded income (\$28,898); November 30, 2022, expenses for the year exceed income (\$30,577.74).

3. Stewardship:

- 2022 Donor reports were distributed.

- Sara launched the "Paint St. Paul's" capital campaign at the annual meeting. Goal \$15,000. Includes pledge cards, mailing, emails, and reminders in the newsletter and bulletin. 3-year collection period. Six returned to Wendy to date for \$4,000+. Additional \$1500 already collected.

- Social Ministry raised \$170 from the CakeWalk Feb 12.

- Social Ministry requests that \$500 be sent from their account to Lutheran Disaster Relief for the Earthquake in Turkey/Syria and for the war in the Ukraine. Bob will follow up.

- Bob reported that an additional \$35 was collected from the Mitten Tree in January for a total of \$320.

4. **Cemetery:** As of January 31, 2023, balance is **\$90,607**; December 31, 2022, balance is **\$86,154.95**; November 30, 2022, balance is **88,206.86**.

Synod and Conference Upcoming Events



• Our 2023 Upper Bucks Conference Assembly will be held in person on Sunday, Mar. 5 @ 2:00 PM at St Andrew's Lutheran Church in [south] Perkasie, led by our dean Pr Erika Wesch. We should have at least two delegates at this assembly and can have a third "youth/young adult" delegate as well. Among other things, we'll be holding an election for our conference dean, voting on our 2023 conference budget, and having more conversations about ministry collaboration between congregations. (Pr Dave will be leading a conversation about new and

ongoing collaborative efforts in our Quakertown Lutheran Cluster.)


- Speaking of collaboration, many of our Upper Bucks Conference congregations continue to be in **pastoral transition:** Quakertown, Trumbauersville, Keller's Church, Richlandtown, Durham, Sellersville, Upper Tinicum, Spinnerstown, and Almont (Sellersville) are still searching for new pastors (most of them "part-time"), with some of the interim/bridge pastors in those congregations now in their third year of service there. Pr John Hansen is now serving as the part-time bridge pastor at Christ's Lutheran in Trumbauersville; Pr Jim Saboe is on sabbatical from Zion, Zion Hill right now. This is just one of the reasons why greater collaboration between our congregations is even more essential right now. Please keep our neighboring congregations, our conference dean, and our Synod in prayer during these times of transition.
- Our 2023 Synod Assembly will be held in person on May 5-6 at Franconia Mennonite Church. The theme is "Transformed to Serve in a 'Where's the Faith?' World". Registration materials and costs are being posted on the synod's website (*www.minstrylink.org*). Far more than being a series of tedious business meetings, our synod assemblies feature dynamic speakers, vibrant worship with many styles of music and leadership, informative displays by organizations and ministries across our synod, and plenty of lively fellowship. Once again, we can have a third "youth/young adult" delegate, and we can also include plenty of visitors (and since the Assembly is within easy commuting distance from our home, it's especially easy for us to visit). To register as a delegate, please inform Pr Dave and then go to *www.ministrylink.org* to register. (We'll cover the cost for our delegates.)
