

Welcome to our worship of the Lord Jesus Christ on this Sixth Sunday of Easter! Though we're well into the Easter season, today's "Rachel's Day" observance carries with it many of the themes of the Christmas season's Feast of the Holy Innocents. In 1994, at Bethel Lutheran Church on the west side of Chicago, a woman who was a member of the church called upon her congregation to stand up against the violence towards the children in her area. Their church began by transforming a vacant lot into a garden, "Rachel's Garden", a place of reflection and mourning for the children killed by gun violence in their area. White crosses were placed for mothers to mourn and reflect. What they discovered was that the visitors were not only the mothers of the children, but others who mourned the loss as well. In 1996 the Metro Chicago Synodical Women's Organization brought the memorial to the Women of the ELCA Triennial Convention in Minneapolis, not only to expand awareness of the violence that children face, but to take actions to address the issue. The memorial was passed, resolving "That ELCA women encourage their congregations recognize the first Sunday in May each year as Rachel's Day, based on Jeremiah 31:15-17 wherein Rachel grieved for her children, to mourn the loss of our children and to renounce the forces of evil and fear that plague our nation."


FIRST READING:


NRSVUE

The Holy Gospel according to Sts Matthew and Mark.




¹³ Now after *the Magi* had left *the child Jesus and His family*, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, "Get up, take the child and his mother, and flee to Egypt, and remain there until I tell you; for Herod is about to search for the child, to destroy Him." ¹⁴ Then Joseph got up, took the child and His mother by night, and went to Egypt ¹⁵ and remained there until the death of Herod. This was to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet, "Out of Egypt I have called My son."

¹⁶When Herod saw that he had been tricked by the Magi, he was infuriated, and he sent and killed all the children in and around Bethlehem who were two years old or under, according to the time that he had learned from the magi. ¹⁷Then what had been spoken through the prophet Jeremiah was fulfilled: ¹⁸ "A voice was heard in Ramah, wailing and loud lamentation, Rachel weeping for her children; she refused to be consoled, because they are no more."

Later, when Jesus was an adult and ministering to the people, ¹³ people were bringing children to Him in order that He might touch them; and the disciples spoke sternly to them. ¹⁴ But when Jesus saw this, He was indignant and said to them, "Let the children come to Me! Do not stop them, for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. ¹⁵ Truly I tell you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God as a little child will never enter it." ¹⁶ And He took them up in His arms, laid His hands on them, and blessed them.

This is the Gospel of our Lord.

Reconciled to God and to one another, we share a sign of Christ's peace.



Lift up your hearts!


Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

that our lives may anticipate that day when You'll make all things new. All this we pray with joy through our Lord Jesus Christ, who's taught us to pray:



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THE HOLY COMMUNION

Now we share God's consecrated gifts among God's consecrated people, knowing that our living Lord Jesus is fully present with us in His Supper, giving Himself to us in bread and wine and forgiving love. Today, we'll share the Lord's Supper by receiving the body and blood of Christ at communion "stations" at the altar rail. Come forward a pew at a time; take a glass already filled with grape juice if necessary. Receive **"the body of Christ, given for you"** from the Pastor; then, by dipping the bread into the wine ("intinction") or drinking the grape juice from your glass, receive **"the blood of Christ, shed for you"** from our communion assistant. We'll pause for silent prayer after we've all communed...


If you're joining us from your home, we invite you to share the bread and cup with one another. When giving the bread to your neighbor, say **"The body of Christ, given for you."** When giving the wine/grape juice say, **"The blood of Christ, shed for you."** Whatever's left over may be reverently eaten and drunk by everyone after our worship is over. 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Is "Rachel's Day" Still Needed?

The original focus of Rachel's Day was and still is shining a light on gun violence against children. Marian Wright Edelman, activist for the rights of children and founder of the Children's Defense Fund, said, "It's everywhere. Guns and violence are in every nook and cranny of America. Many children can get a gun quicker than they can get a book out of the library. That puts us all at risk." She said this following the Sandy Hook Elementary School shooting in Connecticut— one of two that week and one of the nine mass shootings in 2012...

Mass shootings are not the only exposure children have to gun violence, certainly, and so we still need a Rachel's Day focus. Violence is embedded into many a child's life. Twenty years ago, the emphasis was the loss of inner-city children to gang gun violence. Drugs, abuse, neglect, poor education, poor health care, and hunger also contributed to the death of children.

Today, children are also threatened with death by suicide, often a result of being bullied. Suicide is the third leading cause of death among young people, according to the United States Center for Disease Control. For every suicide among young people, there are at least 100 suicide attempts. More than 14 percent of high school students have considered suicide, and almost 7 percent have attempted it. Bulling victims are between two to nine times more likely to consider suicide than non-victims, according to studies by Yale University.

Ending violence seems a difficult challenge today because our children's forms of play— violent online and video games, for example— create a dangerous environment and a formidable opponent for adults who want to protect them. But no group of children is safe until all children are safe...
