Welcome to our worship of the living God on this 19th Sunday after Pentecost! In today's gospel reading, Jesus tells a vineyard parable which serves as an image of Israel, the prophets' mission, and Christ's death. For Christians, the vineyard also speaks of God's love poured out for us in the blood of Christ given to us for the forgiveness of sin. Grafted onto Christ the Vine in our Baptism, we're nourished with wine and bread and the very life of Christ so that we may share in Christ's sufferings and know the power of His resurrection.

Now, buried with Christ in baptismal repentance and raised through His forgiveness, let's walk with Him in newness of life.

PREPARATION FOR THE WORD:

Sung to the tune of "Open Now Thy Gates of Beauty" ELW 533

Alleluia! Lord and Savior, open now Your saving Word. Let it burn like fire within us; speak until our hearts are stirred! Alleluia! Lord, we sing for the Good News that You bring.

FIRST READING:

Isaiah 5.1-7

NRSVUE

I will sing for my beloved my love song concerning his vineyard:

My beloved had a vineyard on a very fertile hill.

² He dug it and cleared it of stones and planted it with choice vines; he built a watchtower in the midst of it and hewed out a wine vat in it; he expected it to yield grapes—but it yielded rotten grapes!

- ³ And now, inhabitants of Jerusalem and people of Judah, judge between me and my vineyard!
- ⁴What more was there to do for my vineyard that I haven't done in it? When I expected it to yield grapes, why did it yield rotten grapes?
- ⁵ And now I'll tell you what I'll do to my vineyard: I'll remove its hedge, and it shall be devoured; I'll break down its wall, and it shall be trampled down. ⁶ I'll make it a wasteland; it shall not be pruned or hoed, and it shall be overgrown with briers and thorns; I'll also command the clouds that they rain no rain upon it.

⁷ For the vineyard of the LORD of hosts is the house of Israel, and the people of Judah are *God's* cherished garden; *God* expected justice, but saw bloodshed; righteousness, but heard a cry!

SECOND READING: Philippians 3.4b-14

NRSVUE

St Paul writes: If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: ⁵ circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; ⁶ as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless.

⁷Yet whatever gains I had, these I've come to regard as loss because of Christ. ⁸More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For His sake, I've suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ ⁹ and be found in Him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the Law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. ¹⁰ I want to know Christ and the power of His resurrection and the sharing of His sufferings by becoming like Him in His death, ¹¹ if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead.

¹² Not that I've already obtained this or have already reached the goal, but I press on to lay hold of that for which Christ has laid hold of me. ¹³ Brothers and sisters, I don't consider that I've laid hold of it, but one thing I *have* laid hold of: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, ¹⁴ I press on toward the goal, toward the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

This is holy wisdom; this is holy word.

THE HOLY GOSPEL:

Matthew 21.33-46

NRSVUE

See ELW 174 for the tune.

Alleluia! Alleluia! Alleluia! Alleluia!

The Holy Gospel according to St Matthew, the 21st chapter. *Glory to You, O Lord!*

Jesus said to the religious leaders who questioned His authority, "Listen to another parable. There was a landowner who planted a vineyard, put a fence around it, dug a winepress in it, and built a watchtower. Then he leased it to tenants and went away. ³⁴ When the harvest time had come, he sent his slaves to the tenants to collect his produce. ³⁵ But the tenants seized his slaves and beat one, killed another, and stoned

another. ³⁶ Again he sent other slaves, more than the first, and they treated them in the same way. ³⁷ Then he sent his son to them, saying, 'They'll respect my son.' ³⁸ But when the tenants saw the son, they said to themselves, 'This is the heir! Come, let's kill him and get his inheritance.' ³⁹ So they seized him, threw him out of the vineyard, and killed him.

- ⁴⁰ Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?" ⁴¹ They said to him, "He'll put those wretches to a miserable death and lease the vineyard to other tenants who'll give him the produce at the harvest time!"
- ⁴² Jesus said to them, "Have you never read in the Scriptures, 'The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone; this was the Lord's doing, and it's amazing in our eyes'? ⁴³ Therefore I tell you, the Kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that produces its fruits. ⁴⁴ The one who falls on this stone will be broken to pieces, and it'll crush anyone on whom it falls."
- ⁴⁵ When the chief priests and the Pharisees heard His parables, they realized that He was speaking about them. ⁴⁶ They wanted to arrest Him— but they feared the crowds, because they regarded *Jesus* as a prophet.

This is the Gospel of our Lord.

THE HOLY COMMUNION

Now we share God's consecrated gifts among God's consecrated people, knowing that our living Lord Jesus is fully present with us in His Supper, giving Himself to us in bread and wine and forgiving love. Today, we'll share the Lord's Supper by receiving the body and blood of Christ at communion "stations" at the altar rail. Come forward a pew at a time; take a glass already filled with grape juice if necessary. Receive "the body of Christ, given for you" from the Pastor; then, by dipping the bread into the wine ("intinction"), receive "the blood of Christ, shed for you" from our communion assistant. We'll pause for silent prayer after we've all communed...

If you're joining us from your home, we invite you to share the bread and cup with one another. When giving the bread to your neighbor, say "The body of Christ, given for you." When giving the wine/grape juice say, "The blood of Christ, shed for you." Whatever's left over may be reverently eaten and drunk by everyone after our worship is over. Once we've all shared in the body and blood of Christ, we continue in blessing and prayer:

SENDING

THANKSGIVING, PRAYER, AND BENEDICTION:

May the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ strengthen us and keep us in His grace.

Amen.

Blessed be Your name, O God, for here we've feasted on Your living Word, Christ Jesus, the joy and delight of our hearts!

Strengthened by this food, may we gather the world to Your banquet, where none are left out and all are satisfied through Christ Jesus our Lord. *Amen.*

Now may God our Creator's perfect word revive your soul; may Christ Jesus be your Savior and your Rock; may the Holy Spirit strengthen you to press ever onward; and Almighty God, Father, + Son, and Holy Spirit, bless you now and forever. *Amen.* How firm a foundation, O saints of the Lord, Is laid for your faith in Christ Jesus, the Word! What more can He say than to you He has said Who unto the Savior for refuge have fled?

"Fear not, I am with you, oh, be not dismayed, For I am your God and will still give you aid; I'll strengthen you, help you, and cause you to stand, Upheld by My righteous, omnipotent hand.

God has a plan. We're it!

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Sensible Justice or Crazy Love?

This parable's kind of crazy when you think about it. Why on earth do these guys think that they're going to inherit the vineyard? Sure, it's a legal possibility— but it's not like that landlord has disappeared. He's sent servants, and more servants, and then his son. Who's to say he doesn't have another son, or more servants, or an army, or at least a gang of thugs at his disposal to take care of these tenants? These tenants are crazy, I tell you...

But they're not half as crazy as this landowner! Think about it: First he sends servants, and they're beaten, stoned, and killed. Then he sends more— not the police, mind you, or an army, just more servants— and the same thing happens again. So where does the bright idea come from to send his son, his heir, alone, to deal with these bloodthirsty hooligans? It's absolutely crazy! Who would do such a thing? No one— except maybe a crazy landlord so desperate to be in relationship with these tenants that he'll do anything, risk anything, to reach out to them. This landowner acts more like a desperate parent, willing to do or say or try anything to reach out to a beloved and wayward child, than he does a businessman. It's crazy—the kind of crazy that comes from being in love!

"What will the landlord do when he comes?" Jesus asks, and all they can imagine is violence: "He'll put those wretches to a miserable death!" But notice, it's not Jesus talking right now; they're condemning themselves. That's part of Matthew's narrative brilliance, I suspect, to have his opponents voice their own condemnation. But it invites us to consider a different question: not "What *will* that landowner do?" And to that question we have Jesus' own answer: the Landowner sent His Son, Jesus, to deal with all of us who've hoarded God's blessings for ourselves and not given God His own due. And when we killed Him, God raised Him from the dead and sent Him back to us yet one more time, still bearing the message of God's desperate, crazy love, still reaching out to embrace us once more to Himself...

Oh, I know: Jesus goes on, at least according to Matthew, to finish this parable and accuse and condemn the Pharisees Himself. But at this point, I think Matthew can't help himself from witnessing to a God that's even more merciful than he can imagine. Jesus slips free of Matthew's grasp for a moment, not simply to stand in judgment of Matthew and so many of us since who've used this story to validate our own causes (though He does that as well, I think), but even more to introduce

us to the desperate, crazy love of God— love offered not once, not twice, but a million times or more to all who will receive it.

Martin Luther once said that sometimes you have to squeeze a Biblical passage until it leaks the Gospel. This is one of those weeks, I think, when with equal measures of patience and faithful pressure we can "squeeze out the Gospel" and give witness to the God made most clear to us in Jesus. Thank God that Jesus— at least the Jesus Matthew witnesses to— is greater than our fear and insecurity, and manages again and again to twist free in order that we might taste the mercy of God...

The Non-Ownership Society

This fall, we're spending a lot of time in the vineyard. Two weeks ago, our gospel reading noted how the vineyard owner graciously hired unemployed workers at all hours of the day, but gave each worker a full day's wage. In last week's gospel reading, two brothers showed us the real meaning of "yes" and "no". This week, the vineyard's in rebellion as the workers seize control and ownership of the property.

It's so easy for tenants to begin to imagine that the vineyard is theirs: "My church... my family... my bank account... my world." All of us do it. It's as natural as breathing! But few of us recognize the violence buried in these simple assertions of ownership and control. Alas, Jesus understands it only too well— for He's the beloved Son who loses His life over such matters, not just once, but time and again!

These delusions of ownership and property rights rob us of the graciousness of the God who offers us everything for free. When we do violence against God's kindness, we do violence against ourselves as well. The cornerstone of God's grace becomes a stumbling block that trips us, a loose stone that crushes us when we dislodge it by our arrogance.

What if *everything* is on loan to us—this church, my family, my bank account? What if God's word to us in our Baptism's really true—"You're Mine! You no longer belong to yourself; My love claims you"? Then everything's different. One world ends and another begins. True obedience is possible; "Yes, buts" disappear, for

"yes" really means yes and "no" means no. The Kingdom's given to us as an undeserved gift on loan, and we're far wealthier than we could ever imagine!
