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Pastor's Corner **By Pastor Dave Heckler**

"And [the angel] said to them, 'Don't be amazed; you're looking for Jesus the Nazarene, who's been crucified. He's risen; He's not here. Behold, here's the place where they laid Him. But go, tell His disciples and Peter, "He's going ahead of you to Galilee; there you'll see Him, just as He told you.' [The women] went out and fled from the tomb, for trembling and astonishment had gripped them, and they said nothing to anyone; they were afraid, for—" [Mark 16.6-8 NASB]

That's the original ending of the gospel of Mark: an angelic appearance, an announcement that Jesus wasn't there but had risen from the dead, a commission to go and tell, the women fleeing in terror and astonishment, and "they said nothing to anyone; they were afraid, for—" an incomplete sentence. No trembling with joy; no "I've seen the Lord!" from Mary Magdalene, apostle to the apostles; just mute fear. It's clear that eventually, they told someone, and they all saw the risen Jesus somewhere along the line, because we're all here testifying to Him. But Mark doesn't give us this. Later editors wrote additional endings to cover over his "mistake"— but Mark clearly didn't think he'd made a mistake. Indeed, I'm pretty sure Mark ended his gospel this way deliberately, to make a point...

What might this tell us?

A number of years ago, over 50 million Facebook users had their personal information and profiles illicitly datamined by Cambridge Analytica, a British company that worked with political campaigns all over the world to misdirect, misinform, and manipulate voters in favor of candidates who were willing to pay big money for their services. Their CEO and chief officers were filmed boasting of their ability to do these things and to compromise political opponents through bribery and adultery stings, among other things. But the most scandalous part of their boast centered on what they were looking for in all those Facebook profiles: "People don't vote for candidates because of their political stances or beliefs. They vote for candidates based on their hopes and their fears. And our business is to identify those hopes and fears and manipulate them to our clients' advantage..." (And BTW, this is now standard practice in social media, so pay attention...)

It begs the questions that won't rest even if buried beneath hours of Alleluias: "What are you truly afraid of— for yourself, for your loved ones, for our nation, for the world? And in what do you find your hope?"

For the women at the tomb, as for many of us, the thing we fear the most is *change* and the re-evaluations change always brings. Most of the changes I've seen in my lifetime have forced me to re-evaluate the entire way I see the world, our nation, its history, and the people around me; and those re-evaluations have never been comfortable for me. "The way we always did things always worked for us; why should we change them?" And truth be told, no matter what the change may be, it means that something in which we trust will have to die. (Perhaps that's why we'll often prefer to fight to the death rather than agree to change—especially if we're well equipped to leverage death on someone else. It's what the religious and civil leaders of Jesus' day did; that's what put Him on the cross in the first place.) And besides, the one thing we human beings have always been able to count on is the allsuperseding permanency of death, the thing that ends all arguments...

But what if the dead don't stay dead? What if death doesn't have the last word, but rather life and love and forgiveness and resurrection? And what if that last statement isn't just some nice heartwarming philosophical platitude, but alive in glorified flesh and blood and looking for us? That's not just a little change on the loose; that's Change with a capital C (or in this case, "CJ" as in "Christ Jesus"). And if even the smallest change is a little death for us, what will Change Risen from Death be? The apostle Paul puts it bluntly in 2 Corinthians 5: It's a whole new creation, a whole new way of seeing the world and its people and our neighbors, especially those who differ from us. It's a whole new calling in life—and all of them defying the death-dealing "ways they've always been". "Why, that'll be the death of us!" we cry. "This is the death of us!" the women might've felt...

"This is my ending; this my resurrection! Into Your hands, Lord, I commit my spirit. This have I searched for; now I can possess it. This ground is holy," Kiraly Imre von Pecsalyi sings in "There in God's Garden" of Jesus' death and resurrection, the wellspring of our Easter celebration. And though this ending be the death of us (not to mention the death of our false prides, our false treasures, and all the idols on which we rely), because that death is bound up with Christ in His death, our own deaths don't have the last word. God's love for us in the crucified and risen Christ Jesus has the last word, and that word is life. And even if the women couldn't bring themselves to say it at that first blush of resurrection, we'll say it for them: Alleluia!

Worship in April: The Feast of the Victory of Our God!

"Hallelujah! Jesus lives!" is the message of resurrection joy that shapes and permeates our worship life together during the month of April. Here's how our celebration of Christ's resurrection victory will take shape during the month of April:

- + During the Easter season, we'll be using the traditional **LBW Holy Communion Setting 2** as our basic order of worship— but with the now-classic (and beloved) Easter canticle "This is the Feast of Victory!" borrowed from Setting 1. Many of you know this setting by heart already, so feel free to sing it and pray it with the joyful abandon of those "born anew into a living hope"!
- + Throughout the Easter season, our **first readings** will be from the Acts of the Apostles, Luke's chronicle of the earliest days of the post-resurrection body of Christ in the newborn Church; our **second readings** will take us through the First Letter of John; and our **gospel readings** (except for the Third Sunday of Easter) will be from the gospel of John. For us as Lutherans, whose perspectives are so profoundly shaped by Paul's writings and theology, our Easter encounters with John's writings will be challenging, but they'll also be a blessing...
- + On **April 21, the Fourth Sunday of Easter,** we'll not only celebrate Jesus as our Good Shepherd, but rejoice as Jesus shepherds little *Olivia Pugliese* through death to life in the waters of **Holy Baptism.** (If you don't recognize the name Pugliese, Olivia's mom is Jen Westervelt. In fact, Apr. 21 is Jen's baptismal birthday, so the date's even more appropriate!) Come share with Olivia (and Jen and Cody and the whole family) in the journey and the joy!
- + Remember that we're sharing in worship and fellowship together both in person and online, and sharing together in weekly Holy Communion. And we'll keep on "livestreaming" our worship services via Facebook Live and streaming the audio of our services via our Free Conference Call line (857.232.0157, conference code 144261).

Account balances: continue to work through previous treasurer's paperwork. April is Parkinson's Disease Awareness Month


Parkinson's disease is defined as a

"neurodegenerative" disease, meaning that it affects the nervous system in a multitude of ways. Currently there is no method to concretely test for Parkinson's Disease nor is there a cure know. The approach to diagnosis is made by a review of the person's medical history, the presence of symptoms, in addition to a physical exam & neurological assess-



ment. The treatment plan is individually based with an attempt to manage symptoms to enhance quality of life for the person diagnosed with Parkinson's.

Initial physical symptoms vary greatly. An early symptom may be a very slight shaking in one hand. As the disease progresses, a distinctive walking gait is often present – shuffling of the feet, a leaning forward type of gait, handwriting changes, and speech difficulties to name a few. Causes such as environment or genetics are suggested but not confirmed. Risk factors include age, sex – men are affected more than women, heredity or possible exposure to pesticides or herbicides. (information review – Mayo Clinic)


