# October 2025 Pastor's Corner by Pr Dave Heckler



For churches like ours in the Reformation tradition, October is a month of celebrations. It's harvest time in many rural areas, which means that churches decorate their sanctuaries and ground with the oranges and browns of autumn, hold Harvest Festivals with plenty of food (and occasionally beer), and celebrate Harvest Home Sunday, gathering the bounties of lands and groceries and bringing them to food pantries to bless those in need. The air turns crisper, which means that air conditioning is seldom needed, congregations return to their sanctuaries, and worship leaders robe up once more. Folks hold Halloween parties and "Trunk or Treat" events and give out goodies to costumed children, spoofing the monsters that might otherwise

terrify us because of the hope and joy we have in Christ's resurrection victory. And of course, right around the same time as Halloween, we celebrate the Reformation of the Church, the grand transformation of European culture and religion born of a new appreciation of the Good News of God's radical and overcoming grace to us in Christ Jesus. We rejoice as though we were the victors, "the ones who were right" (and sadly, often lapse into denigrating our Roman Catholic neighbors), and pat ourselves on the back for our superior theological insight...

But as any student of history will tell you, the Reformation and its aftermath were hardly clear-cut "victories" for anyone concerned. In the aftermath of the Reformation, rival kings, territories, and religious groups fought each other to consolidate their power and/or defend themselves against each other, leading to hundreds of years of warfare, tens of thousands of people turned into religious refugees (including my own ancestors), political turmoil in every European land as well as lands in "the New World", the Inquisition, and all sorts of other chaos. It took a long time for the Western Church and its new denominations (not to mention the governments of those lands) to work their way through these conflicts; and I'm not sure they're quite settled even yet. And perhaps more to the point, Christians who experienced these conflicts or inherited their wounds have had to work through the trauma of those times. Sometimes we've done that well; and other times, well, we've just warmed over the same old mistakes our forebears made, utilizing technologies that make the Reformation's revolutionary printing press look like the caveman's hammer and chisel...

Once again today, we celebrate the Reformation and its message of God's death-defying grace in a time of revolutionary and convulsive change. In my lifetime, born of the economic boom of the 1950s and 60s, we've seen the civil rights of all sorts of marginalized communities asserted and affirmed in waves, only to see them scoffed at, inhibited, and taken away in waves of fearful counter-reaction. We've declared "War on Poverty", then heard that "greed is good" in response. We've had our national (and religious) exceptionalism challenged, then forcefully reasserted, and often violently on both fronts. New technologies have arisen with great promise for human progress, but have arisen with such accelerating speed that we barely have time to adjust—and often find ourselves trying to do so as those technologies are being weaponized for destruction and/or unbridled profit. It's no wonder we live in a time of deep division when people are fearful of each other, distrustful of institutions, authorities, and experts, and only too willing to strike out in violence of all sorts against their neighbors.

So how, then, do we survive in this age? How, indeed, might we (and the Gospel, for that matter) come to thrive?

In the last several weeks, I've devoted some of my devotional time to working through the daily reflections found in <u>For Such a Time as This" An Emergency Devotional</u> by Hanna Reichel, a systematic theologian and church historian from Princeton Theological Seminary. You might expect such a book to be theologically dense and hard to understand— but its beauty is precisely that it's neither of those things. Instead, it uses the basic shape of our Sunday worship (Gathering, Word, Meal, and Sending) and stories from the Scriptures to recall us to some of the most basic Christian spiritual practices around and prepare us as individuals and communities to survive, thrive, and be catalysts of healing and community building in troubled times. I know it's not Advent or Lent yet, and so investing some extra time in devotional reading may seem to be "out of season"; but working with and through this book is well worth your while (and it's not a big and cumbersome book either).


Just as the Reformers lived in tumultuous and challenging times, so do we. But as they found in their own experience, when the storms of history rise up and threaten to swamp us, sometimes the best thing we can do for ourselves and others is to rediscover the basics of Christian witness and discipleship. *For Such a Time as This* is a good resource for doing that. Check it out...



#### Worship in October: God's Grace Changes Everything!

Here at St Paul's, our worship services are joyful celebrations of God's grace in Word and Sacrament, filled with music and worship settings both traditional and contemporary. Here's what's happening in our worship life this month:

- + Sundays in October: This month, we'll be using as our base liturgy Marty Haugen's "Now the Feast and Celebration", with a few variants here and there. We've already sung several of its canticles before ("Now the Feast and Celebration", "Praise to You, O God of Mercy", "As the Grains of Wheat"), so it won't be totally new to us.
- + October 5, the 17<sup>th</sup> Sunday after Pentecost, is **World Communion Sunday** a Sunday in which Christians of all denominations revel in the gift and power of Holy Communion. The reality of Christ Jesus' presence with us in this sacrament, giving us His very life in the humble means of bread and wine and uniting us with Himself and with one another as one body of Christ, is a mystery, a wonder, and a precious gift that never gets old.
- + On **October 12**, we'll celebrate **"Harvest Home" Sunday.** Bring your gifts of non-perishable food items to worship with you that Sunday or before; we'll place them around the Harvest Home display in the front of the sanctuary and bring them to the Quakertown Food Pantry after that service.
- + On **October 26**, we'll be celebrating **the Reformation of the Church** with festive Holy Communion, the posting of Martin Luther's 95 Theses on the church door, plenty of red paraments and garments, and rejoicing in the amazing, life-changing grace of God that even after a half millennium still changes everything. (And if you have a great red outfit other than perhaps a Santa Claus suit, this is the day to wear it!)



- + And then on **November 2**, we'll celebrate **the Feast of All Saints** with a festive service of Holy Communion using the grand liturgy of LBW Setting 2. As we remember our brothers and sisters who've died over this past year, we'll be singing "This is the Feast of Victory!" with gusto and chanting the Kyrie and Proper Prefaces joyfully, rejoicing in the beauty of the Lord's holiness. We'll light the Paschal Candle in remembrance of Jesus' resurrection shared with them, and light votive candles in their individual remembrance. (Be sure to "call in" the names of your recently deceased loved ones to Aly at the church office [215.536.5789] by Oct. 26 to have them listed in the bulletin and named in the service.)
- → By the way, November 2 marks the end of Daylight Savings Time— so before you go to bed November 1, make sure to make your clocks "fall back" one hour (if they don't already do so automatically) so you can enjoy the extra hour of sleep before joining us for worship Sunday morning!
- + Remember that we're sharing in worship and fellowship together **both in person and online.** We've resumed sharing Holy Communion at the altar via "continuous Communion"/"stations", receiving the cup via "intinction" (dipping the wafer into the wine or grape juice). And we'll keep on "livestreaming" our worship services via Facebook Live and streaming the audio of our services via our Free Conference Call line (857.232.0157, conference code 144261).

No matter which service[s] you attend, you'll find them to be great events for the whole family. So don't just be a "spectator"— invite your friends, neighbors, and relatives to join you for these marvelous services, and come on out!

## October's "Monthly Special": "A Woman's Place"




Our "Monthly Specials" and "Noisy Offerings" are special opportunities for giving to help specific ministries in our community and beyond—some of them through

All proceeds from this sale benefit the Scouts' ongoing activities.



#### Household Hazardous Waste Collection October 25 at Strayer Middle School

Bucks County will be holding its final local **Household Hazardous Waste Collection** Event on **October 25, 8:30 AM-2:00 PM** at **Strayer Middle School** in Quakertown (1200 Ronald Reagan Drive).

Household products containing toxic chemicals, like pesticides, oil-based paints, solvents, cleaning products, weed killers, and automotive batteries can be a threat to people and the environment if improperly discarded.

Never throw these materials into the trash, as the toxic chemicals may harm sanitation workers, or result in fires in collection vehicles. It's also not safe to pour them into a sink or storm drain as they can end up in the environment polluting the air, water, or soil.

You can bring up to 25 gallons or 220 pounds of hazardous products to this collection event. Keep in mind that hazardous products will have cautionary words on the label, such as "Danger", "Warning", or "Caution". Other words or phrases that can signal hazardous products include: "poisonous", "hazardous", "combustible", "flammable", "corrosive", "volatile", "caustic", "irritant", "explosive", "toxic", "use with adequate ventilation", or "avoid inhaling". Such items include pesticides, weed killers, flammables, lead/acid batteries, household batteries (rechargeables and lithium), CFL light bulbs, caustics, propane tanks (20 lbs. or less), and the like. **DO NOT BRING** latex paint (it's not toxic, it's water-based— remove the lid to allow to air dry or mix with kitty litter until no longer a liquid, and then discard the mass in a plastic trash bag), appliances (with or without Freon), asbestos, biological waste, explosives, gas cylinders (greater than 20 lbs.), regular alkaline household batteries, PCBs, pressurized CFCs (greater than 1 lb.), radioactive waste, or tires. #### Financial Highlights August 31, 2025

- Our 2025 deficit through August 31<sup>st</sup> is \$28,976.40. Our projected 2025 Budgeted deficit is \$40,741so we are unfortunately on pace to hit our budgeted deficit.
- Our Vanguard investment accounts continue to see gains for 2025. Invested Balances are \$127,266 in mutual funds plus marketable CD's totaling \$150,259 receiving over 4.25% interest. Bank account balances total \$28,896. Accrued interest on Vanguard CD's is \$1359.
- Cemetery assets total \$101,011 which includes Vanguard investments and local bank balances.


