Pastor's Corner By Pastor Dave Heckler

I recently heard a news segment that chronicled an oft-forgotten byproduct of concussions. Most of us are familiar with the usual symptoms (dizziness, nausea, confusion, difficulty focusing one's eyes, etc.); but often, they're accompanied by a strange sort of hearing loss: a difficulty distinguishing a detailed sound (like a friend's speech) from its surrounding loud background noise. Sometimes, in fact, the background noise sounds far louder than it really is. Often it's not recognized as a "hearing problem" because the ears themselves are fine— but it's a hearing problem nonetheless. And to those afflicted with this problem, a great deal of life can get "lost in translation".

In most classic liturgical churches during the Easter season, the first readings for each Sunday come from the Biblical book of Acts. And throughout the opening third of this book, there's this refrain that pops up repeatedly in the apostles' preaching: "***This Jesus, whom you killed, God raised up— and of this, we're witnesses!***" It's a striking phrase precisely because even weeks after Jesus' death and resurrection, Jesus' apostles recognized that some critical implications of those events were already getting "lost in translation", and so had to be reaffirmed:

- ✦ ***This*** Jesus, the ***Crucified*** Messiah (see 1 Corinthians 1.18-31) ...
- ✦ ***This*** Jesus, ***not*** Jesus Barabbas (see Matthew 27.17), the violent insurrectionist whom many acclaimed as a "savior" and "son of the [Maccabean] fathers". (Sound familiar?) Indeed, Matthew's gospel makes it a point to have Pilate ask the crowd, "Which Jesus do you want me to release for you? Which "son" of which "father" do you prefer?"
- ✦ ***This*** Jesus, who drove the religious gatekeepers crazy by embracing the outcasts, uplifting the most vulnerable, and eating with them, healing them, and loving them ...
- ✦ ***This*** Jesus, whom ***we*** killed to keep the world safe for our death-dealing "normalcy" ...
- ✦ "***This*** Jesus, whom ***we*** killed, ***God*** raised up"— because Jesus' resurrection wasn't just a miraculous reanimation of one man or the guarantee that we'll all have some kind of life after death; it was God's vindication of Jesus' entire way of life, and God's rebuke of the death-dealing ways of "the powers that be" of every age and human culture ...

The Easter season in general— and certainly this Easter season, which occurs at the same time as the Passover celebration and the culmination of Ramadan— is always a time of great celebration and feasting and joy and all the sound and music that come with such things. We rejoice in God's victories over the enemies that enslave and break us down; and we cast our victorious Lord in the garb of conquering champions who pound on our enemies and pulverize them; and then we seek to pattern ourselves and our lives and our societies in the image of "Conquering Champion Jesus." And once we do, it doesn't take very long before we're labeling our "enemies" ***God's*** enemies and giving ourselves divine justification for slaughtering them, or at least making sure that they stay in "their place"— and the real Jesus gets "lost in translation", confused with Jesus Barabbas. (What's going on in Ukraine right now is just one example of this...)

But the Good News of Easter calls us to be clear about whose victory we're celebrating, and what that victory means not only for us, but for all our neighbors whose possibilities for rejoicing are constantly being muted by the struggles of living in an apparently "dog-eat-dog" world. The Good News of Easter challenges us to be absolutely clear about the Jesus whose death we've all been complicit in, and how we've all been complicit in that death— and then to grapple with what it means for us and for "the way things have always been" among us that the Creator of the Universe, the Source and Goal and Meaning of Life, has raised up and vindicated ***this*** Jesus and ***His*** way of living in a violence-laced world. And then the Good News of Easter— the Good News of God's love for us in Christ Jesus— compels us to be ***witnesses***, ambassadors of Christ and ministers of reconciliation, people who display the victory of the way of Jesus in our own lives by pouring ourselves out "for you", for all our neighbors in need, and by defying the cheap and easy "ways of the fathers" that only add to the death toll of the world.

"***This*** Jesus, whom ***we*** killed, ***God*** raised up—and of that, we're witnesses!" Can I get a witness, people? Can our community, even as we celebrate Jesus' resurrection with all manner of festivity, be brimming and vibrantly alive with such witnesses? May it indeed be so, through Christ Jesus our Lord!

Rebooting St Paul's Health Ministry



The ministry's focus wouldn't be limited to just physical health, but would be an integrated approach of care for body, mind, and spirit. (Note: This ministry wouldn't be a "hands-on"

ministry in the sense of even a licensed nurse providing care such as dressing changes, medication administration, or blood sugar checks.)

We're hoping we can get this ministry back in action in the relatively near future—but we need your input to do so! 

May Worship News

Thank God it's springtime! Thank God it's May! The weather's getting warmer (and staying warm more consistently), the sun's higher in the sky, and we're rejoicing in the resurrection victory and the risen life of Christ Jesus our Lord. And this year, the month of May brings us into the season of Pentecost as well—and with it, the beginning of new opportunities for our worship life. Here's what coming up this month:

- ✦ We begin May solidly in the **Easter season**, using the traditional **LBW Holy Communion Setting 2** as our basic order of worship—but with the now-classic (and beloved) Easter **canticle “This is the Feast of Victory!”** borrowed from Setting 1. Many of you know this setting by heart already, so feel free to sing it and pray it with the joyful abandon of those “born anew into a living hope”! (And we'll be celebrating Holy Communion on May 1, 15, and 29 and June 5, 12, and 26 as well, so we'll be doing plenty of feasting!)
- ✦ **May 8**, the Fourth Sunday of Easter, is also “**Good Shepherd Sunday**” and **Mothers' Day**— a great day to celebrate God's shepherding love displayed in the lives of all the women who've nurtured us with grace, wisdom, and self-giving love. In addition, we'll be bringing back a treasure of our life together: We'll have a **children's message by Stefanie Bauman**— so it's a great time to bring out the kids! Come join us in person if you're able!
- ✦ On **May 29**, we'll celebrate **the Ascension of Our Lord**, rejoicing not in Jesus' departure from us, but the transformation of His presence with us from tangible visibility to ubiquity. As the classic hymn sings, “Christ is alive! No longer bound to distant years in Palestine, He comes to claim the here and now and conquer every place and time.” (And in Pr Dave's definitely unofficial terms, this marks the beginning of the “Spring Trifecta” of Ascension, Pentecost, and Holy Trinity...)
- ✦ Remember that we're sharing in worship and fellowship together **both in person and online**. As we gather **in person**, we're still doing our best to observe the COVID safety protocols of safe distancing and limited physical contact as we worship together; and we're encouraging those who feel the need for additional caution to wear face-masks as well. We're still making the pre-packaged wafer-and-grape juice Communion sets available for those who desire them—but we've also resumed sharing Holy Communion at the altar via “continuous Communion/ ‘stations’”, encouraging folks to come forward a pew at a time to ensure safer distancing. And we'll keep on “**livestreaming**” our worship services via Facebook Live and streaming the audio of our services via our Free Conference Call line (857.232.0157, conference code 144261).

No matter which service[s] you attend, you'll find them to be great events for the whole family. So don't just be a “spectator”— invite your friends, neighbors, and relatives to join you for these marvelous services, and come on out!



“The Hand of God Shall Hold You...”

On Going Finance Business:

1. **Vanguard Account Balances:** As of March 31, 2022, balance is \$114,411.33; February 28, 2022, balance \$114,033.44; January 31, 2022, balance was \$125,125.95. Tom will transfer management to Rich during the next month. The biggest change between January and February was related to paying the painting bill and providing an infusion to pay the church's operating expenses. Some change was related to declining investments related to the stock market volatility.
2. **Income statement:** As of March 31, 2022 expenses for the year exceed income (**\$11,034.34**); February 28, 2022, expenses exceeded income (**\$6473.48**); January 31, 2022, expenses exceeded income (**\$3711.27**). Big expenses this month included health insurance, pension and fuel oil.
3. **Stewardship:** First quarter report for pledging giving: of 23 giving units, total pledge was \$12,831; actually received \$12,856 for a net positive of \$25. Two are under their pledge; 13 are meeting their pledge and 8 have given more than their pledge.
4. **Cemetery:** Account totals as of March 31, 2022, balance is \$92,714.12; February 28, 2022, \$92,413.87; January 31, 2022, \$94,165.05. Gordon Bryan is developing a new sheet advertising rates. Mowing charge for this year will be \$350 per mow (every two weeks). Next highest bid was \$500.


